Missionary To Get Use Of New Plane
ST. LOUIS (AP)—A specially-equipped Cessna six-seater plane with a 1,000-mile range will be flown Tuesday to Nairobi, Kenya, where it will be presented to an American missionary, Brother Michael Stimac.

The plane, which will be delivered by Max Conrad, 63, sometimes known as the flying grandfather, was purchased by a St. Louis group for a new organization, the United Missionary Air Training and Transport (UMATT).

UMATT is starting a flight training program at Dayton, Ohio, that will be open to members of all faiths interested in becoming pilots or in learning how small planes can be used more effectively in African missionary work.

The plane was presented Sunday to Brother Thomas Dwyer of Dayton. Both Brother Stimac and Brother Dwyer are members of the Roman Catholic Brothers of Mary, which has missionaries in Africa.

The UMATT flight training program will be conducted at the University of Dayton.

SPIEGEL SIGNS BRANDO

LONDON (AP)—Movie producer Sam Spiegel has announced the signing of Marlon Brando for a lead role in his forthcoming film, "The Chase." The picture is scheduled to start production in Hollywood early in April with Arthur Penn directing the Lillian Hellman screen play. It marks the first reunion of Spiegel and Brando since "On the Waterfront" which earned them both 1954 Academy Awards.

U.S. Willing To Attend Conference In Cambodia

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States has notified Britain and several other countries that it will "gladly participate" in a proposed nine-nation conference on Cambodia. Such a gathering could lead to informal talks on ending the Vietnamese war.

The decision to participate in a Cambodian conference, if one is called, was made last week by President Johnson. He already has decided that he would name Ambassador W. Averell Harriman as U.S. delegate to such a meeting.

The U.S. readiness to attend was announced Sunday night by Secretary of State Dean Rusk, who said:

"It has been proposed that an international conference composed of the governments of the countries which took part in the Geneva conference of 1954 be called to consider the question of the neutrality and territorial integrity of Cambodia."

"After reviewing this proposal with the President last week and at his direction, we have informed a number of interested governments that if such a conference is called we will gladly participate."

"The President would appoint Ambassador Averell Harriman

as our representative to the discussions."

The British government, which with the Soviet Union was co-chairman of the 1954 Geneva conference on Southeast Asia, has been working with the Soviet Union and other countries for several weeks to see whether it would be possible to arrange a meeting on Cambodia.

The original proposal for the meeting came from Cambodian Prince Norodom Sihanouk as an evident move to secure the independence of his country which is a neighbor of South Viet Nam.

Britain's major interest in the proposed conference, however,

obviously has been that it would bring together representatives of many governments directly or indirectly involved in the war in South Viet Nam and would thus afford an opportunity for Vietnamese peace talks.

The nine nations which could be included in the meeting are the United States, Britain, the Soviet Union, France, Communist China, North Viet Nam, South Viet Nam, Laos and Cambodia.

Rusk did not refer to the Vietnamese conflict or to the possibility of peace talks in announcing U.S. willingness to attend the proposed Cambodian conference.

"Cambodia desires indepen-

dence and neutrality," he said. "Here as elsewhere in Asia the United States wholeheartedly supports the right of each nation to shape its own course."

"To support this right for Cambodia is fully consistent with the purpose of the United States to support the right of every nation in Southeast Asia to lead a free and independent existence."

U.S. officials said that in recent days there had been increasing interest on the part of a number of governments which would take part in the conference to get such a meeting organized. They also said there had been many inquiries during the weekend about the U.S. attitude. These two facts, they said, were chiefly responsible for determining the timing of the Rusk announcement.

They were uncertain, however, whether agreement was wide enough to assure that a conference would in fact be held. Much of the uncertainty centered on Red China's attitude.

The Soviet government and the North Vietnamese regime declared little more than a week ago that they favored the proposal for a meeting on Cambodia. Saturday, however, Sihanouk was reported in dispatches from Cambodia to have said it was not necessary to have the United States and South Viet Nam at the conference.

His statement was taken here as an indication that he was under pressure from Red China to block agreement on the proposal and therefore avoid creating an occasion for Vietnamese peace talks at this time.
