KKK Distributes Folders On 4-Day Meet In Warren

Klan To Gather In Farm Field Northeast Of Lebanon Friday

LEBANON—The "Klaron Kall," an invitation to the four-day Ku Klux Klan Memorial Day weekend rally, was passed out this weekend in this area.

The page leaflets explain the meeting and has a map of the Oregonia farm location for the rally, five miles northeast of here.

Mrs. Louise Witte of Cincinnati, in charge of the plans and in the area yesterday designated the site as the Parkie Scott farm on Lincoln road at its dead-end on Wilmington pike.

Mrs. Witte said response "has been tremendous" and that a record crowd is expected at the 15-acre camping site.

"The KKK movement here seemed to fold after the defeat of Al Smith for president — then the depression came on and there were too many other worries for people."

"But in the last 10 years there has been a lot stirring in this area. Applications and interest now warrant a revival," she said.

Klansmen do not anticipate any difficulty in holding the meeting, she said. She added that the organization will have its own guards and they "know the Warren county police will co-operate in keeping peace."

The Klaron Kall announces (in part): "To all Klansmen, their ladies and white 100 per cent Americans — Come hear our program if you are interested in taking your country back and to have any questions you might have about it answered."

"The changes we endeavor to make will be by the ballot and the boycott. Socialism parades under both the Democrat and Republican labels. And, while we are called extremists, remember this — we stand where we always have stood — our problem seems to be that the 'center' continues to move toward the left."

It advises the rally begins at 6 p.m. Friday and will continue through Monday. And that the welcome speech will be given by the Hon. James R. Venable, Imperial wizard of Knights of Imperial, Ga.

Cross burnings are scheduled for Saturday and Monday nights at 8 p.m. According to Mrs. Witte, crosses will be placed this week. The leaflet advises that guards will be on duty around the clock, that camping is free and family camping is encouraged. Also that no intoxicating drinks will be permitted, but that soft drinks and sandwiches will be available on the grounds.
