

# WORLD Parish

The World Council of Churches and the Vatican have completed organization of a joint committee to seek ways in which Catholics, Protestants and Orthodox Christians can work together on a global scale.

Formation of the 14-man committee is one of the significant ecumenical developments in recent years. It will work out plans for "practical collaboration" in service to humanity and will take up problems causing tension, such as interfaith marriage, proselytism, and religious liberty.

Two Dutch clergymen will be co-chairmen. They are Dr. Willem A. Visser 't Hooft, general secretary of the World Council of Churches, and Bishop Jan Willebrands, secretary of the Vatican's Christian Unity agency.

Jewish leaders have appealed to Congress to pass resolutions condemning anti-Semitism in Russia.

Rabbi Joachim Prinz, president of the American Jewish Conference on Soviet Jewry, told the House Foreign Affairs Committee that the State Department is fearful of an official American statement which would do more harm than good, but that he does not agree.

He said expressions of "outraged public opinion" from this country could have a helpful effect on Soviet policy.

Dr. Erich Goldhagen, director of the Institute of East European Affairs at Brandeis University, said there are only about 50 rabbis to minister to an estimated 5.5 million Soviet Jews. The average age of the rabbis is 65 and there are no Jewish Theological Seminars to train replacements.

Unless Russia lets up on a policy of "cultural genocide," he said, within a decade or two "it will be difficult to find within the Soviet Union a man capable of performing a Jewish religious burial ceremony, a Jewish wedding or a bar mitzvah."

He said teaching the young Hebrew or Yiddish is prohibited. Dr. Prinz said the evident "ultimate purpose" of Soviet policies is "to remove Jews as a distinctive entity among the diversity of mankind."

The Spanish government has authorized four new Protestant churches in addition to 12 new ones licensed last month. The new churches, all Adventist, are in Barcelona, Valencia and Bilbao.

Elimination of world hunger as a major national objective, and a policy statement on equal voting rights for persons of any race are among top items on a two-day agenda at this week's National Council of Churches' General Board midyear sessions.

National leaders of 30 denominations also will discuss Christian responsibilities for education. A message would urge churches to accept greater responsibility for developing weekday programs of religious education.

A plan has been formed for creating a joint working relationship between two of the oldest and most active Protestant overseas missionary agencies.

They are the United Church of Christ's Board for World Ministries, and the division of world mission of the United Christian Missionary Society of the Christian Churches (Disciples of Christ).

"This action may lead to union of the two organizations," said Dr. Alford Carelton, executive of the UCC board.

Directors of his board voted unanimously to enter the arrangement. The United Christian Missionary Society will vote on it June 15.

Spiritual leaders of Conservative Judaism have put forward a plan for establishment of a worldwide organization to embrace the "totality of Jewish life."

The proposed organization, if approved, would begin where the World Zionist Organization left off and would seek to unite the three major branches of Judaism for at least some purposes.

# Crash Directs Couple Into Missionary Work

## Hughes Engineer and Wife Going to Africa to Develop Native Aerial Communication

George L. Raymond, 49, a balding, convivial pilot with 1,500 flying hours to his credit, guided the helicopter along the ridge route last Christmas Eve. He and his wife, Helen, were making for Bakersfield.

They were forced low by a fog bank, and when a rotor blade failed they had no chance. The plane crashed.

"It ended up in a mess no higher than your desk and about as big," Raymond recalled. "We had no business walking away from it. But we did."

He and his wife suffered only minor injuries. The mishap itself, and the fact that they were spared, caused them to think deep thoughts. They owed a lot to Someone, they figured.

Marianists Dreaming  
The problem was, how to pay it back?

Deep in East Africa about this time, the Marianist fathers were dreaming dreams and working hard to make them come true.

The Society of Mary is not very large, as Catholic orders go. It was started in this country about 1849 and has about 200 priests and 1,100 brothers in its four American provinces.

But the Marianist mission and educational impact far outweigh its numbers, and in East Africa the Marianist fathers and brothers have a large and growing influence.

East Africa is a land of veldt and desert, thorn trees, grassy plateaus, dry river beds, thriving cities, high mountains, great herds of game and some people as primitive as any on earth, while others are as cultured as any that can be found anywhere in Africa.

Widely scattered mission stations, commercial ventures, schools and other establishments seek to minister to the East Africans. A basic problem is communication among them.

Thus the Marianists decided that radio and the airplane could become major communications tools. They envision a program to train Africans to fly and hope to operate an unscheduled airline linking Nairobi, Kenya, with such remote places as Lake Victoria, Lake Rudolf and Mt. Killimanjaro.

The idea originated with Brother Michael Stumac, who went to Nairobi after years of teaching at the University of Dayton in Dayton, Ohio.

10 Brothers Help  
His ideas were approved by the Rev. James M. Darby, provincial of the Cincinnati Province of the Society of Mary, which assumed nominal responsibility in this country for the project. The program is called the United Missionary Air Training and Transport, and Brother Stumac is its director.

Ten Marianists were assigned to help with the project. It was decided that the service and training program would be non-denominational. Money was collected from various sources and airplanes were borrowed.

About this time Raymond saw news items about the work and wrote to find out more about it. Today he has an armload of letters from Marianists and others interested in the project—and he also has an acceptance of his offer to go to work for it.

Raymond will take a summer course orienting him for missions work in Africa and then he and his wife will leave for Nairobi. He is enthusiastic, but one small cloud did dim his horizon.

Problem Is Solved  
"UMATT has acquired a Cessna 206 bush airplane in this country," he explained. "A recent letter suggested I deliver it when I go to Africa."

"Last time I flew the Atlantic I had four fans working for me, and I have no desire whatever to cross that pond with one!"

However, that is an item already worked out. The airplane, typical of the sort the project will acquire as it grows and as funds hopefully become available, will seat six, carry 1,000 pounds of freight and have an 800- to 1,000-mile normal range.

Max Conrad, the famous "flying grandfather," will leave St. Louis with the Cessna 206 Skywagon today on the 9,000-mile flight to Nairobi.

It will be the center of ceremonies at St. Louis, Dayton, New York, Boston, Shannon, Rome, where Pope Paul VI may personally bless the plane, and Nairobi.

"Brother Mike hopes to see the East African economy developing swiftly," said Raymond, "and wants this project to phase into it as it grows. As openings appear he wants Africans trained as pilots, mechanics, meteorologists and in other skills ready to fill them."

"There has never been a native pilot in Africa. All the flyers there now are Caucasian or of Indian origin." Raymond is an Episcopalian and his wife is a Baptist. About 300 airplanes are flying in various parts of the world for missions activities, but none, so far as he knows, are supported "collectively," Raymond said.

"Then she learned that Nairobi is a modern city with supermarkets, taxicabs and every convenience and her anticipation improved markedly."

Actually the Raymonds may be in Africa only temporarily. The Marianists want also to start similar projects and services (if this one works out), in the Australia-New Guinea area and in South America.

These projects, like the East African one, will be to assist missionaries of various faiths, "for all men of good will doing humanitarian work," as one letter said.

Would Participate  
In addition a training school is envisioned, perhaps not in the immediate future, in Baja California, where students would be able to work under mission conditions and fly over rugged terrain.

Raymond would have a part in such a training program, he hopes, if he sticks to the Marianist program.

"We eagerly took quite a salary cut to go into this," he said. He is an engineer, employed at Hughes Aircraft Co.

"My wife and I pay taxes on \$17,000 of income. The top pay for this project is \$3,000. But the outlook is permanent, at any rate."

"I am not going out under any contract, but when I asked back at Dayton how long my job would last, they asked me, 'How long do you want to live?'"

# Fund Drive for Negro Colleges in Southland

An "educational community chest" for 33 private Negro colleges in the South is under way here with a goal of \$100,000 as Southern California's contribution toward the national mark of \$5 million.

Local chairman for the United Negro College Fund appeal is V. John Krehbiel, Pasadena insurance executive and civic leader.

Proceeds of the annual fund-raising event are used for scholarships, textbooks, classroom equipment and salaries in the 33 schools, where Negro youths are trained for positions in science, commerce and industry.

Last year Californians contributed \$84,000 to UNCF, Krehbiel announced.

"This year one more college has been added, student enrollment has increased to more than 30,000 and we have increased our national goal from \$3 million to more than \$5 million," he said.

Krehbiel said he is appealing for contributors to double their financial support.

"The need is immediate and critical that Americans everywhere help these private Negro colleges," Krehbiel said. "It is a tangible and explicit investment each one of us can make to provide meaningful help toward solution of the Nation's No. 1 problem."
