

Head Start Voted Full \$353 Million

WASHINGTON—The Senate has voted to inject \$75 million into the summer job program for needy youths—with Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey casting the tie-breaking vote—an extra \$25 million for project Head Start.

3 Killed; One Shot, 2 Beaten

CINCINNATI—Police searched for clues which would shed light on causes of three unrelated, violent deaths recorded in Cincinnati Monday.

Two of the victims died as a result of severe beatings, the third was shot to death. In each case, at least one suspect was questioned but no charges were filed immediately.

THE VICTIMS, all Cincinnatians, were:

- Jane A. Friend, 40.
- Sir Shelby Jones, 48.
- Verlis McClure, 31.

Police said the body of the Friend woman bore multiple bruises, indicating she had been struck repeatedly. Officers found the body in the bedroom of the woman's apartment in suburban Walnut Hills.

JONES, according to witnesses, was felled by several shots from a 25-caliber pistol when he returned with a shotgun to a downtown tavern he had just left and fired at the jukebox.

Jones earlier had been playing the bowling machine at Tiny's Bar, and the bartender ordered him to leave when he became unruly. He returned with the scatter gun.

The bartender, witnesses said, shot Jones after he shattered the jukebox with a shotgun blast.

McClure, found unconscious last Saturday in a hallway of an apartment complex near downtown Cincinnati, died Monday in General hospital.

Authorities said injuries over his body indicated he had been beaten.

Humphrey's vote Monday provided a 43-42 victory for Sens. Robert F. Kennedy (D-N.Y.), Joseph S. Clark (D-Pa.) and Jacob K. Javits (R-N.Y.). They said the \$25 million was needed to restore a cut voted last year in the antipoverty program for pre-school children.

Congressional enactment of the restoration would provide the full \$353 million originally sought by the administration, Clark said.

Kennedy said that if Congress cuts Head Start funds, "it would be a terrible, terrible mistake."

Vet Pensions Hiked

WASHINGTON—A bill originally intended to prevent reduction of veterans pensions—but which in fact could increase most of them—has passed the Senate and sent to the President.

The measure, passed Monday, was designed to prevent pension loss as a result of the Social Security benefit increase which went into effect this month. It would reduce total income of many pensioners by putting them in a higher pension-limiting bracket.

Strike Break Near?

WASHINGTON — A breakthrough in the 242-day copper strike appeared today as union representatives prepared to make a decision on new contract offers by major copper companies.

Representatives of the 26 unions involved in the strike were to resume studying late today a new contract offer by the Phelps-Dodge Corp.

Temperature to Drop With Passage of Low

An extensive low pressure system moving from northern Mississippi, Alabama, and western Tennessee toward New York brought rain, snow, and sleet into the area.

Snow depths ranging—from two to five inches are predicted in Ohio before ending tonight. The local forecast calls for a 3-inch snowfall.

The snow began in the Cincinnati area around midnight and by dawn today had spread northward over much of the rest of the state.

Temperatures will range from a high today in the mid 30s to a low tonight in the low 20s. Wednesday will be cloudy and continued cold, with a high in the 30s, with the passage of the low system.

Forecast

DAYTON AND VICINITY—Heavy snow warning. Snow today, occasionally mixed with rain, ending early tonight, accumulating to about three inches. Windy and colder today and tonight. High today in the mid 30s, low tonight in the low 20s. Wednesday, cloudy and continued cold, high in the mid 30s. Probability of precipitation near 100% today, 70% tonight and 20% Wednesday.

NATIONAL—Snow flurries are forecast for Tuesday night in central New England and for area from lower Great Lakes to Ohio Valley. Rain and showers are due in the South with colder weather. Showers are expected in the northern Rockies and rain is predicted for the Pacific northwest.

OHIO—Heavy snow warning except southeast portion. Snow and winds today; expect rain or rain mixed in extreme south and southeast. Snow amount 3 to 5 inches or more before ending near early today and east late tonight and early Wednesday. High today 30-30. Low tonight 22-32. Partial clearing and continued cold Wednesday.

KENTUCKY—Heavy snow warning north today. Cloudy and colder today and tonight with occasional rain and scattered thunderstorms today with rain changing to snow by afternoon, accumulating up to 4 inches along Ohio River in north portion before ending in west late this afternoon and during the night over remainder of state. Wednesday, decreasing cloudiness and cold. High today in the upper 30s to the 40s. Low tonight in the 20s and 30s.

INDIANA—Hazardous driving and heavy snow warning all but extreme northwest today. Cloudy, windy and cold with snow central and north and rain changing to snow south today; snow accumulations in excess of 4 inches likely all but extreme northwest portions by evening. Snow ending and colder tonight. Wednesday, partly cloudy and cold. High today mostly in the 30s.

LOWER MICHIGAN—Partly cloudy north, cloudy south, windy and colder today with occasional light snow developing extreme south and southeast, windy and colder tonight. Chance of locally heavy snow extreme southeast this

evening. Wednesday fair to partly cloudy and rather cold. High today 13-26 north, 23-34 south. Lows tonight ranging from near zero extreme north to 12-22 extreme south.
