## Edith Enters Zurich Jail

ZURICH, Switzerland (AP) — Edith Irving said when formally being taken into custody, "I surrender because I hope and believe that I will be given a fair trial."

Mrs. Irving, who entered a Zurich jail Monday, is charged in connection with a \$650,000 fraud stemming from the Howard Hughes autobiography hoax of her writer-husband, Clifford Irving.

Authorities say that under the complex Swiss system the formal indictment on fraud, forgery and counterfeiting charges may not be drawn up until next year. They added, however, that the two months she served in the United States in connection with the case would be deducted from her sentence if convicted here.

Clifford Irving is serving a 2½-year term in the Lewisburg (Pa.) Federal Penitentiary for his part in the scheme.



## Bobby Gets His Prize

REYKJAVIK, Iceland (AP) — "Bobby has a check for his prize," says an aide to Bobby Fischer, the new world chess champion. "He'll probably cash it and spend it all. But he'll need a wheelbarrow to take it away in."

Fischer's entourage left Reykjavik Monday, leaving behind the American chess genius and his \$78,125 in prize money from the Icelandic Chess Federation.

Fischer and Boris Spassky, the Russian champion Fischer defeated, are also splitting \$122,500 in prize money put up by British financier, James D. Slater.

Fischer's share from Slater is \$76,562.50 making his total purse \$154,687.50. Spassky's loser's purse came to \$92,812.50, counting the \$45,937.50 he will get from Slater.

Fischer plans to stay in Reykjavik for at least a week. Spassky plans to return to Moscow on Thursday.

## Mayor Is Crime Victim

BALTIMORE (AP) — Mayor William Donald Schaefer got a first-hand look at crime in Baltimore when a youth ripped the watch off his wrist while he was stopped in his car at a traffic light.

The incident occurred Monday night while the mayor was driving his private car near his West Baltimore home. Schaefer, who was not hurt, gave chase to a youthful suspect and was later joined by a patrolman, but no arrests were made.

## Pompidou Plans Trip

PARIS (AP) — President Georges Pompidou has announced that he will make an official trip to China at the invitation of the Peking government.

Speaking to French journalists at Elysee Palace, his official residence, Pompidou declined Monday to say specifically when he would make the trip. But he said it could be in the near future.

## Three-Day Week Experiment Begins

GASTONIA, N.C. (AP) — Wales Manufacturing Co., a textile firm which produces knitted fabrics, went on a three-day work week Monday.

Lester Cutler, the company president, said his 120 employes have been divided into four groups. Each will work three 12-hour days for 40 hours pay, then have four days off. The plant will be open 24 hours a day, Monday through Saturday, he said.

The president said he began the new schedule because of high absenteeism under a four-day, 40-hour week begun a few weeks ago. He said he hopes employe morale will improve and expects the new program will attract more employes.

Before the summer change to four days a week, Wales was on a five-day, 40-hour schedule.

## Presidential Politics Dominate Conference

HILTON HEAD ISLAND, S.C. (AP) — The Southern Governors Conference hears more talk about presidential politics today with the arrival of Vice President Spiro T. Agnew.

Agnew will address a dinner at the conference — two days after Sen. George McGovern, the Democratic presidential nominee came to this island resort for a three-hour parley with the governors.

Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace, wounded in an assassination attempt last May, arrived Monday afternoon and also will be at the dinner. He was brought by helicopter to the 18th hole of a Hilton Head country club, where he was met by about 200 persons.

The conference, scheduled to end Wednesday, has been dominated by talk of presidential politics.

McGovern said he sought no endorsements but received two — from South Carolina Gov. John West

and Gov. Bob Scott of North Carolina. Scott was the first Southern governor to announce that he would chair the South Dakota's campaign in his respective state.

Scott, whose term expires this year, called a news conference Monday to criticize Democratic politicians who have shied away in large numbers from supporting the national ticket.

"I don't have much use for those people who are too weak to get out and support the party that has given them an opportunity to serve," said Scott.

Maryland Gov. Marvin Mandel, who earlier had endorsed McGovern, told newsmen he felt the two Deep South endorsements represented a "dramatic breakthrough" and he said he anticipated more.

But Mandel agreed with Southern governors who told McGovern that President Nixon currently was far ahead of him south

## 'Wings Of Hope' To Aid Missions

NAZARETH — An aerobatic show featuring skydivers, stunt pilots, comic flyers, and an outstanding sailplane artist will be held at the Pocono International Raceway, Mount Pocono, Sept. 17 at 2 p.m.

The 2½ hour performance is sponsored by Wings of Hope, a non-profit, non-sectarian organization based in St. Louis, which provides aviation and communication services to remote areas of the world for humanitarian purposes.

Proceeds from the show will primarily benefit the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart in New Guinea, who use aircraft in the widely scattered tropical islands for transporting teachers, doctors, nurses, and mission personnel and for medical emergencies among the thousands of natives they serve.

The Pocono Raceway has donated the use of its facilities for the benefit show, and many prominent men in the aviation industry and operations are assisting the project as members of an advisory board.

Andretti at Show Mario Andretti, three-time national USAC champion and Grand Prix race car driver, is the honorary chairman of the show. From 12:30 to 2 p.m. he will give rides around the track in special race cars.

After a spectacular flag-jump opening by the Adventurers skydiving team, performances will be staged by Ray Wiseman, Dan Chapman, Dawson Ransome, Scotty McCray, and several members of the Mason-Dixon air show troupe, whose acts include an inverted ribbon cut and a girl-rider on an airplane wing. Announcers for the show will be Captain Jim Webb of Eastern Airlines and Russ Brinkley, president of Silver Wings.

The Missionaries of the Sacred Heart (MSC) were aviation pioneers in the northern islands of the territory of New Guinea.

Twenty-six years ago, three of the original seven American MSC priests assigned to the area after World War II obtained pilot licenses before going there. They foresaw air transportation as the key to modern progress in the primitive South Pacific islands and as a necessity for health emergencies.

### Flying Padres

The immediate business of rebuilding Churches, schools, and hospitals destroyed by the war, as well as the lack of adequate funds, delayed air travel for several years. But two of the "flying Padres," Bishop Alfred Stemper, MSC, head of the Kavieng, New Ireland, mission and Father Anthony Gerdusa, M.S.C. finally obtained airplanes and built air strips in the late 1960's.

The third, Father Charles Patrick, MSC, returned to the U.S. and is the present provincial superior of the American MSC Missionaries. The cost of replacing the well-used mission planes and of maintaining and fueling the new ones is the reason for this year's air show in the Poconos.

Gates will open for the Air Show, Sept. 17 at noon.

## Newsday To Stop Endorsing

GARDEN CITY, N.Y. (AP) — Long Island's Newsday, the nation's largest suburban newspaper, announced today it is ceasing endorsements of presidential or other political candidates in order "to maintain our independence."

The newspaper, in an editorial by president and publisher William Attwood, expressed the hope that other newspapers would join Newsday "in breaking with an obsolete tradition and asserting its political independence right through election day."

Although it will not make a choice between President Nixon and Sen. George McGovern, D.S.D., Newsday said, "We will take stands on the issues that emerge in this and future political campaigns and on the performance of the candidates."

## Gets Dad's Forgiveness

# 'Good Man' Kills Mom

INDIALANTIC, Fla. (AP) — "I forgive my son for what he did, and she would too," said Roy Styers, who returned home from a fishing trip and found the bloodsoaked body of his murdered wife.

Styers, whose 57-year-old wife Betty was killed when her head was battered with a

claw hammer, added that his son "is a good man who didn't know what he was doing."

Officers said shortly after the killing Saturday, 26-year-old Arthur E. Styers rushed into the Indialantic police station on Florida's Atlantic coast and said he wanted to report an emergency.

"I may have killed my mother but I am not sure," the young Styers told dispatcher Neil Chancellor. "I am taking drugs and I think I am hallucinating."

Chancellor said the younger Styers burst into tears as he pleaded, "Please, call this number and find out for me if it is a hallucination."

The officer dialed the Styers' home and discovered it was no hallucination.

"He killed my wife, He's gone crazy," said the older Styers, who had just arrived home and found his wife's body.

Sgt. Nick Ball of the Brevard County Sheriff's Department said young Styers was transferred from County Jail Sunday to the psychiatric ward of the Florida Hospital in Orlando

after he reportedly beat his head against the bars in his cell.

His father blamed the tragedy on an accident several months ago in which Arthur suffered serious head injuries.

## Workshop Set At Tower City

The third annual Legion Day at Scotland School for Veterans Children, Franklin County, will be held Saturday, Oct. 7 for Legionnaires and Auxiliary.

He said doctors wanted to have the son committed to a hospital but he and his wife objected. "We thought it was better to have him home with us."

The father added, "Arthur called me last night to say he was sorry. My son is a good man."

Sheriff's Sgt. George Ashlock said that the son was charged with first-degree murder.
