The petition was brought by R. L. Tribe, of the Oak Hills Assn. Inc., through its attorney William T. Thurman. The petition asks that cer-

tain areas zoned Residential R-2 be zoned Residential R-1. The former permits two-family dwellings, and the latter does not.

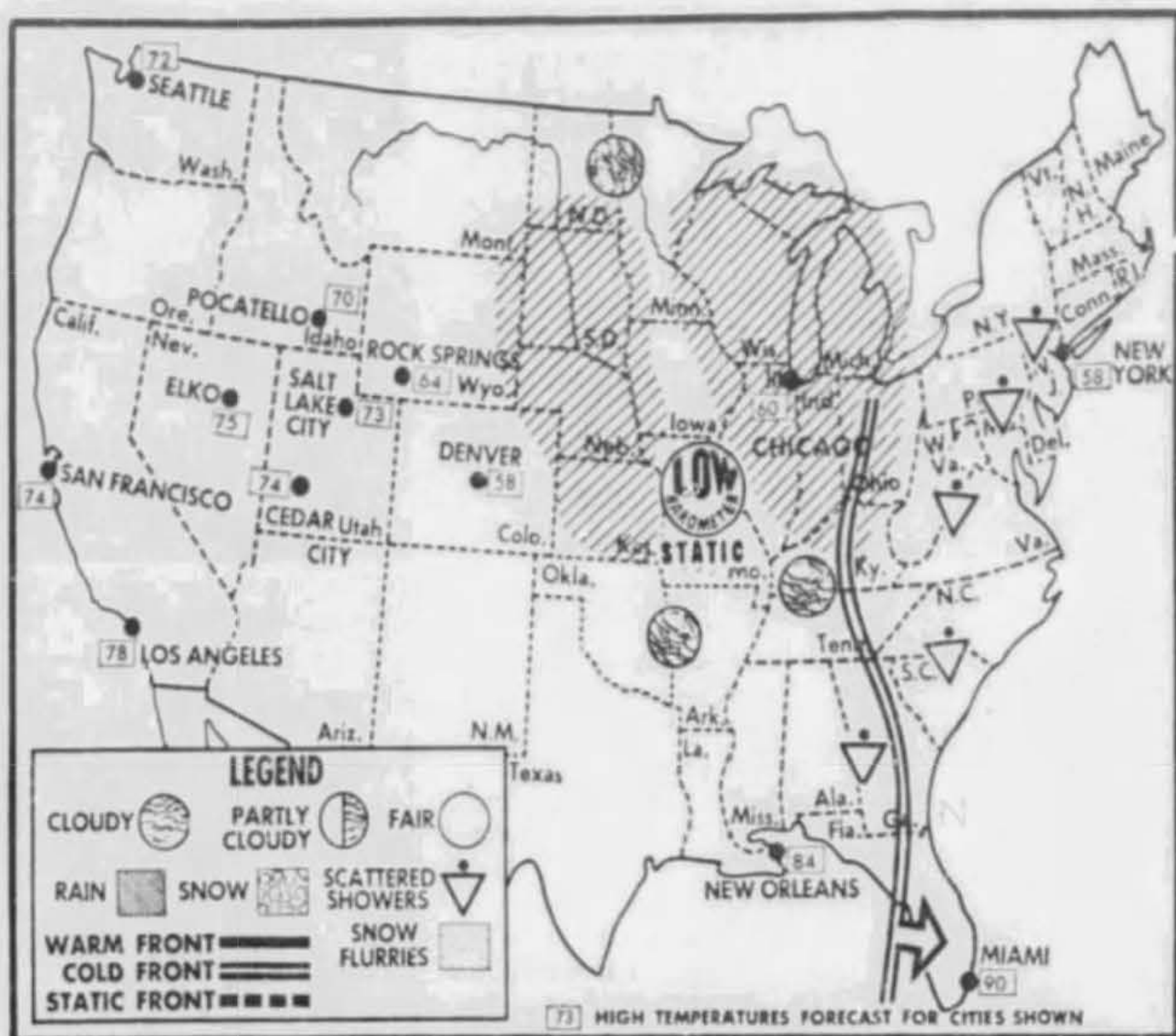
It also asks that areas zoned R-2 and Business B-3 be rezoned to Residential R-2A, which permits multifamily dwellings under a number of conditions.

Another section would revert from B-3 to R-1.

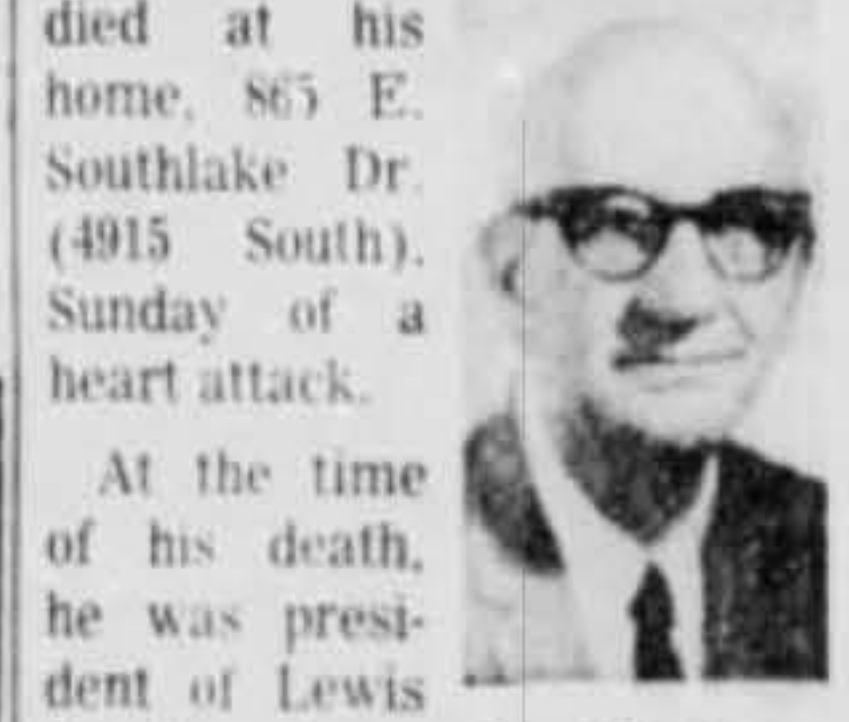

Lewis Flinders, 65-year-old petroleum executive and former finance chairman for the Utah Republican Party, died at his home, 865 E. Southlake Dr. (4915 South), Sunday of a heart attack.



At the time of his death, he was president of Lewis Flinders, Inc. Mr. Flinders was born Nov. 1, 1907, to John T. and Elizabeth Fawson Flinders. He married LaRue Hunter on June 14, 1930, in Parowan.

Survivors include his widow; two sons, Roger Salt Lake City; John C., Huntington Beach, Calif.; five grandchildren; two brothers and four sisters. S. A. "Sam", and Mrs. Sarah Jones, both Salt Lake City; Earl, Corvallis, Mont.; Mrs. Mary Hatch Bancroft, Idaho; Mrs. Audrey McCoy, Mrs. Ethyl Shields, both Tooele.

Funeral services will be held Wednesday at noon, at 260 E. South Temple, where friends may call one hour prior to services. Burial will be in the Salt Lake City Cemetery.

MOAB — An 18-year-old Salt Lake City youth suffered broken wrists and severe facial injuries early Sunday when he fell 75 feet from a rock ledge in Nigger Bill Canyon about two miles upriver from here.

William H. Blair, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert C. Blair, 207-5th Ave., was in serious condition at Holy Cross Hospital where he was flown shortly after the 6 a.m. mishap.

Scaling Cliff  
Grand County Sheriff Hach Bowman said the Blair youth and James Twelves, no age or address listed, were scaling a cliff in the canyon while a group of friends waited at the bottom of the canyon about three-fourths of a mile away.

Loses Footing  
Mr. Blair apparently lost his footing and struck a ledge about 35 feet below his position before falling on to the rocky ground below.

Sheriff Bowman said the victim was carried to State Road 128, about three-fourths of a mile from the scene of the accident, by his friends and taken to Moab by ambulance. Doctors there recommended he be flown to Salt Lake City for treatment, the sheriff said.
