# Air pioneer raps growth of bureaucracy, calls FAA leadership best in history

"The proliferation of bureaucracy in this country is my hangup," aviation pioneer George E. Haddaway told 80 members of the East Central Ohio Pilots Association Tuesday night at the Arrowhead Country Club in North Canton.

Haddaway, editor and publisher of Flight Magazine since 1934, illustrated his point by reading a new federal regulation. The rule permits an executive to take his secretary along on business trips without her having to pay more income tax because of the "fringe benefits" (enjoyment of flying) derived from the trip.

HADDAWAY SAID that regulation — he called it AB 75-21B — is the only good federal aviation regulation he can find.

But he said he is still confident about the future of general aviation because "we have more friends in Congress now than ever before... and the Federal Aviation Administration's top leadership is the most competent in history."

"Let's change this nation from a nation of bureaucracy to one of free enterprise," Haddaway said.

Asked about the fuel situation for general aviation, Haddaway said sun power and oil from shale are "years off."

"We are dependent on petroleum and Congress should turn the petroleum industry loose (remove price controls on domestic oil)," he said. Haddaway commended the ECOPA members for their contribution to "Wings of Hope," which he called the "only totally aviation-oriented charity."

"WE PLACE little planes, pilots and communications systems in remote parts of the world — mainly to support medical missionaries," he said of Wings of Hope. The organization accepts no government money.

Haddaway appeared here at the invitation of Mrs. Henry H. Timken Jr. of Jackson Township, past president of ECOPA. Haddaway praised Mrs. Timken as having "national status" in aviation.

# Canton only major Ohio city reporting decrease in crime

Canton reported a decrease in crime during the first half of 1975, while all other major Ohio cities reported increases.

A preliminary FBI report released Tuesday by U.S. Atty. Gen. Edward H. Levi shows that Canton was the only one of nine Ohio cities with more than 100,000 population which showed a decrease in crime for the report period.

CANTON'S CRIME index decreased by 287, from 3,289 to 3,002, according to FBI figures. The index includes crimes of murder, non-negligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary or breaking and entering, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft.

Among Ohio's other large cities Columbus, with an increase of 5,828 in reported crimes, showed the largest rise. It was followed by Cleveland's increase of 4,002 and Dayton, third with a 2,767 increase.

Robberies in Columbus jumped from 802 to 1,105, larcenies from 8,701 to 11,430 and burglaries from 5,345 to 7,647, the FBI figures showed.

Levi said the 13 per cent increase this year compared with a 16 per cent increase in the first six months of 1974.

## Hammer pleads guilty

WASHINGTON (AP) — Multimillionaire Armand Hammer pleaded guilty today to federal campaign law violation, but a federal judge hesitated to accept the plea because of a conflict over whether the oil magnate can serve a prison term.

Hammer, chairman of the Occidental Petroleum Corporation, admitted to concealing \$54,000 in contributions to the 1972 re-election campaign of former President Richard M. Nixon.

THE MONEY was funneled through former Montana Gov. Tim M. Babcock, who pleaded guilty almost 10 months ago to similar charges.

Hammer, standing rigidly in the courtroom, was asked at least six times by Chief U.S. District Judge William B. Jones Jr. if he understood that a guilty plea could result in a maximum three-year prison term and fine of \$3,000.
