BRISBANE, Australia (AP) — A 24-year-old blonde who has looked into the jaws of 1,000 sharks in the last three years has flown off to the United States hoping for more of the same - but this time in the film "Jaws."

Kim McKenzie, a top Australian woman surfboard rider and government contract shark catcher on Queensland's Sunshine Coast, flew to the United States to promote the Schmirnoff Surf Classic in Hawaii.

Her promotional tour includes New York, San Francisco and Los Angeles. But as far as she is concerned one of the highlights of the trip will be seeing "Jaws." "I've read the book and I'm

dying to see the movie," she said before she left here. "The author didn't put too much that was false into the book. Basically it was pretty correct, although it is

Miss McKenzie should know. She has been a professional fisherwoman, prawner and shark catcher since she was 14 years old.

The last three of her 10 years at sea along Queensland's Pacific Ocean coastline have been as a government contract shark catcher. first in partnership with her kept the story under wraps for father, Roy McKenzie, then by herself

Eighteen months ago Miss McKenzie took over the contract, working the shark nets and setting hand lines off beach resorts over a 40-mile strip of coastline herself. She works the nets and handlines outside popular

Miss McKenzie estimated she had caught about 1,000 sharks since she and her father took on the contract three years ago.

She believes there is nothing unusual about a woman holding a shark-catching con-

"I've been at sea all my life and I don't have much trouble," she said.

Despite her close daily contact with sharks and the terror they can project even in death, Miss McKenzie does not fear them when she surfs. "My work doesn't turn me off surfing. The book didn't and I don't think the film will.

"But I'm still looking forward to seeing the film, probably in New York," she said.

TOKYO (AP) - Prime Minister Takeo Miki and the members of his cabinet agreed today to spend about 12 per cent of their salaries each month on government bonds to encourage the public

The government is planning to float \$24 billion worth of bonds to cover the deficit it anticipates for the fiscal year beginning April 1

Miki's pay is \$4,200 a month, and he will buy \$504 worth of bonds. His ministers get \$2,800, and their bond quota is \$336.

My Answer

Life Should Change Spouse

By BILLY GRAHAM Q. My husband is not a Christian and he even refuses to go to church with me. He just does not seem interested in spiritual things. I get after him for this and try repeatedly to convince him that he is wrong, but it does not seem to do much good. What do you suggest? - Mrs.

A. I appreciate your concern for your husband. However, I wonder if it has occurred to you that your constant criticism may actually be hurting him rather than helping him. Human nature being what it is, we all tend to react negatively to people who tell us we are wrong, and criticism often has the opposite effect to what we intended. Let me make two suggestions to you. First,

pray consistently for your husband, that he may come to see his need of Christ. Pray also for yourself, that you will have wisdom to help him find Christ. And pray that you will learn when to speak and when not to speak, and that your words will be spoken in love. The writer of Proverbs described the perfect wife in this way: "She openeth her mouth with wisdom; and in her tongue is the law of kindness. (Proverbs 31:26)

Second, remember that your example of

love may be far more important than your

words alone in winning him to Christ. You may

even need to confess to him that you have been

harsh in your words, and that your desire is to

reflect Christ in your life. Remember the word

of Peter: "You married women should adapt

yourselves to your husbands, so that even if

they do not obey the Word of God, they may be

won to God without any word ever being spo-

ken, simply by seeing the pure and reverent behavior of you, their wives." (I Peter 3:1-2.
