Mercy Plane Dedication To Be Held Here Tuesday

"The Spirit of Indianapolis," an aircraft that soon will fly medical and other assistance to people in jungle areas of Paraguay, will be dedicated in ceremonies at 11 a.m. Tuesday at Indianapolis International Airport.

The Cessna 185 will be operated by Wings of Hope Inc., a St. Louis (Mo.) based non-sectarian, non-profit organization which has been providing planes, pilots and communications systems for remote and impoverished areas of the world since 1966.

The plane, which will serve as an airborne delivery truck, taxi and ambulance, was purchased and equipped through a \$75,000 grant from Lilly Endowment Inc.

Ray Wright, a veteran Wings of Hope pilot who will make the delivery flight to Paraguay and operate the plane there for awhile, will fly the aircraft to Indianapolis. The Rev. Raymond McKee, a Catholic priest who served as a field representative for Wings of Hope in Paraguay, will be with him.

Wings of Hope will be represented at the dedication by Joseph G. Fabick, president, and William D. Edwards, executive director, with Indianapolis Wings of Hope leaders Myron F. Melvin and Dr. W. Brooks Fortune.

Other participants will be Milton H. Slosson, president of the Indianapolis AirPort Authority, and Thomas H. Lake, chairman and president of Lilly Endowment.

'Options' Planners Failing To Listen, NESCO Says

The School-Community Action Team (SCAT) has failed to involve the community in the planning of "options education" and to build understanding of the program, the Near East Side Community Organization (NESCO) charged Friday.

"SCAT has refused to listen to what the community has been saying in meeting after meeting throughout Indianapolis," the organization said. SCAT was responsible for the development of the program.

More than 30 meetings have been held to explain and to answer questions about the Indianapolis Public Schools Options program.

"The question is not desegregation," NESCO says. "We all understand that

IPS is under court order to complete desegregation." The court has not ordered options or anything like it, the association said.

School officials contend that since more than 80 per cent of parents surveyed about options indicated they wanted no change in schools, the options program will not bring about any major changes, the statement said.

Where a child attends school will be determined by desegregation guidelines, school officials say.

NESCO recommended that during the 1978-79 school year parents and teachers work together within their own schools or small clusters of schools to design educational improvements.

Resignations Pain Pope

Vatican City (AP) — Pope Paul VI expressed "immense pain" Friday about resignations from the Roman Catholic priesthood, estimated at between 2,000 and 5,000 every year.

"The destiny of the weak ones who have found the force to desert their pledge confounds us and makes us invoke the mercy of God," he told an audience of Italian priests.

In 1975, the latest year for which statistics are available, 4,000 priests of a total of 405,000 quit the priesthood.

The problem is even more serious among nuns. The Vatican says about 10,000 a year left convents between 1973 and 1975, of nearly 1 million worldwide.

MANY PRIESTS and nuns, whose vows require celibacy, quit to marry. But many others leave in an open breach with Catholicism.

Precise totals of resigned priests in the United States have not been disclosed, but 1975 estimates put the number at 7,000 during the previous decade, with the rate of departures generally believed to have slowed.

The 80-year-old pontiff spoke Friday to about 500 priests representing the Rome clergy in a traditional Lent audience in the Sistine Chapel.

He did not quote statistics, but in an emotional voice, said the problem of

priests leaving the church "is present every day in our pain and in our prayer."

"STATISTICS distress us, the individual cases disconcert us, the motivations impose on us reverence and compassion but cause us immense pain," the Pope said.

Vatican observers said the Pope's comments may have been sparked by fresh worldwide data that the Vatican statistical office may have submitted to him for last year.

The Pope and many bishops said last year they were satisfied at the number of new priestly vocations, reportedly rising in many countries.

But the total of priestly positions vacated by death and defections is higher than the number of newly ordained priests. The number of persons being baptized into the Roman Catholic faith is increasing.

Heroin Deaths Decline 40%

Washington (AP) — The top White House drug control official testified Friday that heroin-related deaths in this country dropped roughly 40 per cent last year as a program to eradicate poppy growing in Mexico gained momentum.

"The efforts taken in Mexico to destroy narcotic raw materials, such as the opium poppy, before they enter illicit channels are the most effective and most cost efficient means of decreasing the flow of drugs such as heroin into the United States," Peter G. Bourne said.

He told the Senate Judiciary Committee's juvenile delinquency subcommittee that the flow of heroin into this country last year was probably at the lowest level in seven years.

Similar testimony was given by Peter B. Bensinger, head of the Justice Department's Drug Enforcement Administration, and by State Department officials.

Sen. John Culver (D-Iowa), the subcommittee chairman, said in opening hearings on the effectiveness of U.S. drug enforcement programs that "most of the heroin currently reaching American streets comes from Mexican sources."

"Since the early 1970's when the so-called 'French connection' was broken by enforcement actions and by the Turkish opium ban, world narcotic trafficking patterns have shifted dramatically," he said.

Present Bill For Solar Research Aid

Washington (AP) — Two congressmen have introduced a bill to allocate \$1.5 billion in federal money over the next 10 years to private companies for research into development of solar energy cells.

Under the bill, introduced by Mike Barry Goldwater (R-Calif.) and Reps. Barry Goldwater (D-Wash.), \$125 million would be distributed in fiscal 1979 to 18 companies currently conducting research in the field.

The focal point of a demonstration held by the congressmen at the Capitol on Thursday was a solar-powered beanie bonnet by Goldwater. But supporters said practical applications could include solar-driven agriculture equipment and household appliances.

A spokeswoman for Goldwater, Signy Ellerton, said federal support for research funded under the bill would drop to 10 percent in 10 years.

China Blames R-Uss In Indochina Conflict

PEKING — China renewed its diplomatic offensive against the Soviet Union Friday, accusing Moscow of "instigating" the Cambodian-Vietnamese conflict.

The Moscow press had "viciously attacked and slandered Kampuchea" to make the Cambodians appear responsible for the fighting, the New China News Agency said. It quoted several Soviet press reports accusing Cambodia of "armed provocations" and "incessant intrusions into Vietnamese territories."
