

SIU-C honors retirees at annual banquet

Southern Illinois University-Carbondale honored employees who are retiring or have retired during the 1987-88 year at a banquet on Wednesday, Aug. 24, in the Student Center ballrooms.

President and Mrs. John C. Guyon were hosts for the annual event, which honors retiring faculty, administrative-professional staff members and civil service employees.

Among the retirees are:
Faculty and Administrative Professional:

James E. Aaron, Carbondale, a professor of health education, with 31 years of service. Aaron, an expert on driving safety, heads SIU-C's Safety Center. He joined the faculty in 1957 as a lecturer and has been a full professor since 1973. He was appointed by former U.S. President Richard M. Nixon to the National Highway Safety Advisory Committee in 1970. Aaron holds a bachelor's and master's degree from the University of Illinois (1950 and 1951) and a doctoral degree from New York University (1960). He is a native of Eldorado.

Joyce Atwood, Camillus, N.Y., a senior editor at the SIU-C Press, with nine years of service. Atwood retired Dec. 31, 1987. In 1985 she won a Fulbright-Hays Visiting Lectureship and taught in Malaysia. She graduated from the University of Oklahoma, and has held several academic publishing jobs at the Naval Institute Press, Annapolis; the East-West Center Press, Honolulu; and the University of Tennessee Press, Knoxville.

Steven Barwick, Carbondale, professor of music, with 33 years of service. Barwick, a pianist, is known for recovering and preserving "The Franco Codex of the Cathedral of Mexico," a foundation of polyphonic choral music written in the 1580s. He salvaged the work and it was published in modern form by the SIU Press in the mid '60s. Barwick, a native of Lincoln, Neb., earned a bachelor's degree at Coe (Iowa) College (1942), a master's degree at Eastman School of Music (1943) and a Ph.D. from Harvard University (1949). Before he came to SIU-C in 1955 he taught at Blue Mountain (Miss.) College, Western Kentucky State College and the University of Pittsburgh.

George C. Brown, Carbondale, professor of journalism, with 32 years of service. Brown came to SIU-C as an assistant professor of journalism in 1956 and also taught printing in what is now the College of Technical Careers. He served as business manager of the campus newspaper, the Daily Egyptian, in the 1960s and worked in the now defunct department of printing and photography from 1965 to 1968. He has at various times been director and assistant director of the School of Journalism and director of journalism graduate studies. Brown headed SIU-C's University Honors Program from 1979 to 1985. The Arkansas City, Kan., native holds bachelor's and master's degrees from the Kansas State Teachers College and a Ph.D. from SIU-C. Before coming to SIU-C, Brown co-owned and managed the Solomon (Kan.) Valley Tribune from 1944 to 1947 and taught printing at Tulsa Central High School from 1948-55.

Mary Louise Brown, Carbondale, academic adviser with the Center for Basic Skills, with 23 years of service. Brown served as an academic adviser in the College of Education when she first joined the SIU-C staff. She holds a bachelor's degree from Northeast Missouri State University (1940), and is a charter member of the National Academic Advising Association. She retired April 30.

Ikuu Chou, Murphysboro, professor of political science, with 24 years of service. Chou earned an undergraduate degree in his native China and won three advanced degrees from the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, Tufts University. An expert on Chinese and Soviet studies, Chou came to SIU-C in 1964 as a visiting professor of government, then took a permanent position as professor of political science. He was on the faculty at the College of William and Mary from 1949-1964 and taught a summer institute at George Washington University from 1956-1960. Last year he was awarded a grant from the U.S. Information Agency to teach international relations at Northeast Normal University in China. He retired May 31.

James M. Crowner, Carbondale, professor of special education with 22 years of service. Crowner spent much of his career finding ways to help emotionally disturbed children. During the 1970s, he spent summers in Jalapa, Mexico, directing an institute that aided handicapped children there. He also set up a special education institute in Malta while on sabbatical leave in 1972. Before he arrived at SIU-C, he organized special education programs at Michigan State University and the University of Arizona. He holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Detroit (1948), and master's and doctoral degrees from Michigan State University (1954 and 1960). He retired May 31.

Edmond A. (Tony) DaRosa, of Lake Mary, Fla., a professor of aviation technologies with 14 years of service. DaRosa officially retired June 30, but had been on disability leave since March, 1979. He came to SIU-C from Lewis (Ill.) College in 1965 to found the aviation technologies program in the School of Technical Careers. During his tenure he garnered some \$2.7 million in gifts and donations for the aviation program. Among the donors was the late Arthur Godfrey, entertainer and flying enthusiast who was a longtime friend of DaRosa. During his 43 years of service in the aviation field, he worked closely with Wings of Hope, a worldwide medical mission-

ary organization. DaRosa immigrated to the United States from his native Portugal in 1936.

George Elston, Herrin, an assistant professor of mathematics, with 34 years of service. Since 1962 Elston worked on SIU-C's annual Mathematics Field Day competition for schools in the area. He has also served on school accreditation teams and conducted mathematics workshops for elementary teachers. Elston taught mathematics at Herrin High School from 1950 to 1962 and also taught part time during many of those years at SIU-C. He signed on with the university as a full-time instructor in 1962. He holds two bachelor's degrees from SIU-C: in mathematics (1947) and education (1950). He earned a master's degree in mathematics from the University of Wisconsin in 1949. He was born in Carbondale, but Herrin has been his home for many years.

Margaret S. Gardner, Carbondale, an associate professor in SIU-C's Rehabilitation Institute, with 27 years of service. Gardner first worked at SIU-C as an assistant instructor at Morris Library and as an assistant instructor and lecturer at the Guidance and Clinical Center from 1949-1953. She worked for the next 13 years as a supervising psychologist with the state's Department of Mental Health and as a consultant with the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services. She returned to SIU-C in 1968. She has done research in gerontology, women's programs and staff training in learning centers for the developmentally disabled. Gardner holds three degrees from Northwestern University (1945, 1946, 1960) and a second master's from SIU-C (1951).

Richard E. Gray, Carbondale, director of the Placement Service, with 22 years of service. Gray started at SIU-C in 1966 as a placement consultant. Before that he taught school, worked as an insurance agent and was a high school counselor. He was promoted to professional placement counselor in 1977 and became director of Career Planning and Placement in 1983. Although he is officially retiring from SIU-C, Gray has accepted a position as chief placement official at Augustana College in Rock Island. He holds a bachelor's degree from Quincy College and a master's degree from SIU-C. His hometown is Quincy.

Robert P. Griffin, Carbondale, an associate professor of English, with 23 years of service. Griffin came to SIU-C from the University of Connecticut in 1965. Between 1968 and 1970 he served as acting director and director of graduate studies in the department. In 1967, Griffin donated \$10,000 to SIU-C to create the Margaret C. Griffin Scholarship fund, a scholarship to help women stay in school. It is named after his mother. He holds three degrees from the University of Connecticut (1955, 1957 and 1965).

John B. Hawley, Carbondale, professor of educational administration and higher education, with 22 years of service. A professor in the Department of Educational Administration and Higher Education, Hawley's first role at SIU-C involved both campuses. He started in 1965 as director of Community Development Services at Carbondale and as a professor in the education division at SIU-Edwardsville. He has spent a good deal of time recently researching the history and sociology of higher education. He holds a bachelor's degree from Hamilton (N.Y.) College (1939), a master's from Teachers College, Columbia University (1948), and a Ph.D. from the University of Michigan (1957). He was a program specialist with the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare before arriving in Carbondale and worked during 1958-61 with U.S. Operations to Iran at Tehran. He is a native of Springville, N.Y.

Donald G. Hertz, Carbondale, associate professor and coordinator of SIU-C's mortuary science program, 23 years of service. Hertz has headed SIU-C's associate degree program in mortuary science since 1969, four years after he joined the mortuary science faculty. Before coming to SIU-C he owned and operated Hertz Funeral Service in Kankakee and was a school teacher in Kankakee. He holds a bachelor's degree from Illinois State University (1950), a master's degree from the University of Oklahoma (1955) and a diploma from the Worsham College of Mortuary Science in Chicago. Kankakee is his hometown. He retired June 30.

Vivienne V. Hertz, Carbondale, an associate professor in the College of Technical Careers, with 20 years of service. Hertz first taught freshman composition as an instructor in the College of Technical Careers and later taught technical writing and business correspondence. She has edited the "Journal of Studies in Technical Careers," published by the college, since 1983. Before she joined SIU-C, she was an elementary school teacher, a secretary and a homemaker. Hertz holds a bachelor's degree from Illinois State University and master's and doctoral degrees from SIU-C. She retired June 30.

Charles L. Holliday, Murphysboro, assistant professor of library affairs, with 30 years of service. Holliday first joined the library's ordering division in 1957 and moved to the social studies division a year later. His work over the years has included desk duty, reference work, processing interlibrary loans and a "little bit of everything." The Murphysboro native earned a bachelor's degree from SIU-C (1947), a master's degree from Washington University (1948) and a master's in library science from the University of Illinois (1964). Before joining SIU-C's staff he worked at the St. Louis Public Library. He retired July 31.

Jeannette Jenkins, Carbondale, an academic adviser in the Office of Teacher Education. During a 25-year career at SIU-C, Jenkins has helped hundreds of students plan their academic pathways. She joined the staff in 1963 with the official title of lecturer in the College of Education and for a time taught an introductory teacher education course. She holds a bachelor's degree from Indiana University of Pennsylvania (1943), and a master's degree from The Pennsylvania State University (1948). Before coming to SIU-C, she was a teacher and principal of the elementary school at Penn State and also supervised student teachers there. Her hometown is Punxsutawney, Pa.

Marvin E. Johnson, Carbondale, associate dean and professor in the College of Engineering and Technology, 40 years of service. Johnson, a native of Albion, came to SIU-C in 1948 as a technology instructor. He was a sheet metal worker with the U.S. Air Force during World War II and has taught industrial safety courses at SIU-C. He served as assistant dean of the College of Engineering and Technology from 1965 to 1982 and filled in as acting dean from 1967-1968. In 1982, he was named associate dean. He holds a bachelor's degree from Eastern Illinois University (1947), a master's degree from the University of Illinois (1948) and a doctoral degree from the University of Missouri (1959).

Dale E. Kaiser, Springfield, a professor of educational administration and higher education, with 22 years of service. Kaiser, a native of Cedarville, holds three degrees from the University of Illinois: a bachelor's in mathematics education (1954), a master's in mathematics (1960) and

a doctoral degree in educational administration (1963). He started his career as a mathematics teacher at the University High School at the U of I in 1957. He came to SIU-C in 1966 as an assistant professor in what is now the Department of Educational Administration and Higher Education. He served as the coordinator for SIU-C's higher education program in the Springfield area and directed SIU-C's School Services Bureau from 1968 to 1972.

Marie J. Kilker, Sarasota, Fla., former director of University Studies, with 10 years of service. Kilker developed SIU-C's University Studies program soon after she arrived on campus in 1978 and became its director in 1979. The program allowed students to tailor their own degree work. Kilker holds a bachelor's degree in English from Clarke College (1954), a master's from Loyola University (1959) and an interdisciplinary Ph.D. from SIU-C (1972). In the late 1950s and throughout the 1960s, Kilker studied at various universities in England, Scotland, France and Ireland. She also completed course work at Northwestern and Georgetown universities. Before coming to SIU-C, Kilker taught English at Western Illinois University and Harris Stowe State Teachers College. In the late '50s and early '60s she headed publications at St. Xavier College in Chicago. She re-

tired July 31.

Ralph H. Laedtke, Libertyville, visiting assistant professor in the College of Technical Careers, with 10 years of service. Laedtke joined SIU-C after retiring from the Navy. He has been off-campus academic program coordinator for the College of Technical Careers's health care management program at Great Lakes Naval Hospital. He's also coordinated SIU-C's fire science program offered at R.J. Quinn Chicago Fire Academy. He is a retired captain and commanding officer of the Naval Hospital Corps School at Great Lakes.

Wilma L. Lampman, Carterville, assistant professor of library affairs, 26 years of service.

What is now the College of Technical Careers at SIU-C was the Vocational Technical Institute when Lampman started working at the library on the Carterville campus. She moved later to Morris Library

on the main campus. Lampman has taught in the Iowa public school system and also worked at Talladega (Ala.) College. She considers Lake Mills, Iowa, her hometown.

Carl Eric Langenhop, Carterville, professor of mathematics, with 27 years of service. Langenhop was Director of Research at Mathematica Inc. in Princeton, N.J., for a year before joining SIU-C in 1961. Before that, he taught at Iowa State University, where he earned his master's and doctoral degrees. He holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Louisville. He served as the acting chairman of the SIU-C mathematics department in 1963 and 1970. From 1967 to 1970 he taught at the University of Kentucky while on leave. He retired May 31. Louisville, Ky., is his hometown.

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
